On the one hand, Paul asks his friends to pray for him that he be granted boldness. On the other hand, however, he writes:

"And I came to be with you in weakness, and in fear, and in much trembling, and my word and my heralding were not with the persuasive words of human

wisdom, but with demonstration of spirit and of power, that your faith may not be in the wisdom of men but in the power of God" (1 Cor. 2:3-5).

To keep from going crazy, Paul surely must have learned the following:

True boldness comes, not from a human ability to succeed, but from a divine inability to fail.

Faith of itself is meritless

his sounds so shockingly wrong that I will quickly explain it in light of Romans 4:16. God's promise of salvation to us is "...of faith, that it may accord with grace."

Can faith take our sins away? No. Give us peace? No. Beware! This is not the message of James, where faith must have works added to it. I speak of that which comes *before* faith, not after, namely: God's grace. Righteousness and peace are gifts; faith is the Godchosen channel acquainting us *with* these gifts. 
"A wretched man am I! What will rescue me out of this body of death? Grace!" (Rom. 7:24). *I* feel better. ■
