The book of Acts is transitional

rom the beginning of time, God had in mind to bring two gospels to this planet. Why? He had two very different things to teach us about Himself. The first lesson was that He was so perfect and righteous that no flesh at all could ever please Him, let alone boast in His sight. The second lesson was: "I am so full of love and grace that not only will morally bankrupt losers be with Me forever, but I will put several

Me forever, but I will put several of them in charge of the universe." Obviously, there would need to be a significant adjustment period between these two radically different themes. You and I would need ten volumes to jump that chasm, but God did the job in one: the book of Acts. Well? He created Earth in six days, did He not?

ACTS CHAPTER 1

ACTS CHAPTER 28

Picture the book of Acts as an X, and you will know more about Acts than most seminary graduates. In the first few chapters, Israel is flying high at the door of the Kingdom and the nations are nowhere. But by chapter 12, Israel's fortunes have deteriorated: Stephen has been stoned, the disciples scattered, and James

killed. In chapter 9, however, God calls Saul, and by chapter 13, the nations are rejoicing in unprecedented grace. By the end of the book, Paul is in Rome writing Ephesians, and Israel is set aside (Acts 28:25-28), until the complement of the nations may be entering.

Could you have said as much in so few words? ■

Jesus was *the* Christ; we, too, are anointed

G od planned from long ago to appoint many christs. Don't get nervous. "Christ" is a title. It means, anointed, which itself means, "an official consecration by means of oil." When a priest



or a prophet was anointed, he was consecrated (declared sacred, set apart) for a Godappointed task. It was symbolic. The priest or prophet was literally *christed*. Thus, anointed ones are *christs*.

Jesus Christ was anointed by God to be the firstborn among many brethren (Rom. 8:29). We are no longer slaves, but sons (Gal. 4:7). To us, then, God is "Abba; Father" (Gal. 4:6). We do not hesitate to call ourselves sons of God, yet to think that we are christs terrifies us. Let it rather bless. A son rests his head upon his Father's bosom; a christ goes forth with a task. We are sons and christs, anointed to bring the celestial world in subjection to God's familial feet. ■

Clouds: practical as all get-out

In the presence of His disciples, Jesus departed Earth from Olivet. "While they are looking, He was lifted up, and a cloud took Him up from their eyes" (Acts 1:9). Why the cloud? It hid Him; He did

not want His disciples witnessing the rest of His startling



startling ascent. When we are changed, we will be snatched away together with the dead "in clouds" (1 Thess. 4:17). Why clouds? Same reason as above: to keep the world out. Some things are just too spiritual for the unsanctified gaze of earthlings.

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Paul gradually replaces flesh with spirit

e cannot imagine how oddly Paul's pronouncement in 2 Cor. 5:16 would have struck contemporary ears:

"We, from now on, are acquainted with no one according to flesh. Yet even if we have known Christ according to flesh, nevertheless now we know Him so no longer."

Up until this time, the only way to God was through flesh: Israel. People of the flesh need signs of the flesh. Don't condemn Israel for this; it aligns with their calling, and God "signed" them bigtime.

Paul's gospel, however, weans us from flesh to spirit. This sounds hard, but it's actually easier than flesh. Flesh changes with the weather. The folks who saw Lazarus walk from the tomb had to re-entomb him and cry all over again. When we're in full realization of the spirit that makes its home in us, we enjoy a continual source of power and light. In other words, it's the opposite of the weather.


We are now blessed with "every spiritual blessing among the celestials" (Eph. 1:3).

Acts and Counter-Acts

THE DOOR/WINDOW PRINCIPLE: ANCIENT BUT GLORIOUS TRUTH



he book of Acts could be nicknamed: "Counter-Acts." For every evil that befalls Israel, God counters with something good for the nations:

7:59—Stephen stoned 8:1—Saul introduced

8:1—Disciples scattered 9:3-6—Saul called

12:2—James killed 13:2—Saul separated by spirit Talk about "Good News/Bad News."
Later, bad things happen to Paul. And yet
God counters these trials not only with
evangelism opportunities, but new
truths. These truths come, not in spite of
Paul's woes, but because of them. In
other words, Paul's trials inform rather
than hinder his new revelations:

14:19-20—Paul stoned at Lystra 2 Cor. 5:16—Paul repudiates flesh

21:31—Paul about to be killed 9:15-16—Prophecy fulfilled: Paul testifies before kings

28:11-31—Paul imprisoned in Rome Eph. 3:8-11—Paul reveals the secret of celestial glory

Isn't this how God works in your own life? He locks a door only to open a window. Just when you think you have reached bottom, God unveils a treasure that you surely would have missed had you not been face-down in the dirt.

O, the depth of the riches and the wisdom and the knowledge of God! (Rom. 11:33) ■

ANTIOCH : NEW SPIRITUAL CAPITAL OF THE WORLD

In the beginning of Acts, Jerusalem is God's headquarters. Later, Paul operates out of Antioch (11:25). The Greek elements of "Antioch" are IN-STEAD-UPHOLD. God's truth is now upheld *here*, among heathen, instead of in Jerusalem, where apostasy reigns.

I have heard you say that we are supposed to be subject to the superior authorities. And yet in Acts chapter 4, Peter tells the Sanhedrin that he must obey God rather than man.

Paul is the one—in Romans 13:1—who says we are to be subject to superior authorities. Peter ignores this for the simple reason that, as he stands before the Sanhedrin, Romans 13:1 has yet to be written. Peter behaved in accord with a then-applicable kingdom truth (the gospel of the Circumcision—Gal. 2:7-8), namely, that true religion trumps human politics. By the end of Acts, however, the kingdom is postponed (Acts 28:28) while God does His grace thing (Acts 20:24) among the nations (Rom.



11:25). Grace presently requires us to bake cookies for our political enemies, rather than, say, egg their houses (Rom. 12:20).

Later, Peter himself recognizes the new era, writing in 1 Peter 2:13-14—

"You may be subject to every human creation because of the Lord, whether to the king, as a superior, or to governors, as being sent by Him ..."

I know this is not nearly as fun and satisfying as civil disobedience, but it sure beats prison. ■

Most of the waitresses are pleasant. They ask your destination, and you yield the






